Mission Statement - To empower children and families who have socioeconomic needs.

Community Action Agency for McHenry County Head Start helps families in need to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

Our vision for the future is that children grow up and achieve economic success so that their children are not born into poverty.

Our method is to combine early childhood education of the highest caliber with innovative family, financial, and health services and targeted community improvement efforts.

We believe every family and every child deserves the same opportunity for success. This is achieved by empowering low-income families with the education and tools they need to break the cycle of poverty. Community Action Agency for McHenry County Head Start provides support and guidance with early childhood education and comprehensive enrichment programs for the entire family.

Community Action Agency for McHenry County Head Start specifically focuses on a two-generation approach that aims not only to prepare young children for future success in school but also their parents through programs designed to increase parenting skills, employability, and earning potential.

COVID-19 Mitigation Plan: Community action Agency for McHenry County Head Start (the Agency) will continually monitor the spread of COVID-19 in the community. The following procedures will be put into place to safeguard the health and safety of staff and children in our care. The health and well-being of our children, families and staff is our highest priority.

The COVID-19 Mitigation Plan supersede any previous policies and procedures and are subject to change with guidance from the Health Department, Office of Head Start, Department of Children and Family Services and the State of Illinois.

The Agency will adapt mitigation procedures to address any outbreak of COVID-19. The level of mitigation will change after a bi-weekly analysis of positive COVID-19 cases in the program and in the county.



Head Start strives to prepare children for school and a life-long of learning through the provision of comprehensive services that support their health, wellness, and physical development. During the 2021-2022 program year, the agency coordinated and provided health and developmental screenings, nutritious meals, oral health, and mental health supports for students while connecting their families with needed medical, education, and family support services.

A focus for the coming year will be on providing trauma-informed care. The impacts of trauma are having a detrimental effect on the mental health and well-being of individuals of all ages. Experiencing trauma can impede an individual's ability to appropriately function, behave, and flourish in different environments. For this reason, the program will implement plans beginning in the 2023-2024 program year to help staff and families recognize and respond to the signs and symptoms of trauma in clients, families, staff, and others connected to the program. By doing so, it will further support our efforts to promote children's school readiness, promote the self-sufficiency of families, and build a better community and future for all.

Changes in the community affected the program's response. With the pandemic, many residents in McHenry County are still struggling economically. Relying on our partner agencies and being connected in the community has been very important. United Way of McHenry County, the Mental Health Resource League, and various community partners and donors, have been playing a very vital role in our community. They take a very active role in filling the needs of families in the county. They have facilitated various fundraising events to collect supplies for those in need in the county, including our program Head Start.

Resources and information are shared with families in various ways. We are in contact with them by phone, email, text, & through Learning Genie, one of the communication systems. Our transportation staff has been delivering school supplies, activities, and meals to the program's families.

Seven Family Outcomes of the Parent Family and Community Engagement (PFCE) Framework.

1. Family well-being refers to families that are safe, healthy, and financially secure.

2. <u>Positive Parent-Child Relationships</u> means that parents and families can develop warm relationships that nurture their child's learning and development.

3. <u>Families as Lifelong Educators</u> refer to the idea that parents and families observe, guide, promote, and participate in the everyday learning of their children at home, school, and in their communities.

4. <u>Families as Learners</u> are the PFCE Family Engagement Outcome that focuses on how parents and families can advance their learning interests through education, training, and other experiences that support their parenting, careers, and life goals.

5. <u>Family Engagement in Transitions</u> is the PFCE Family Outcome that focuses on how parents and families support and advocate for their child's learning and development as they transition to new learning environments.

6. <u>Family Connections to Peers and Community</u> emphasizes the supportive role of connections with peers and mentors in a family's life.

7. <u>Families as Advocates and Leaders</u> highlight the importance of parent and family participation in leadership development, decision-making, program policy development, and community and state organizing activities.



Crystal Lake Center Parent Engagement Training

For FY 2021-2022, 100% of the children received medical and dental exams. Children also received health, dental, mental health, and nutrition services.

The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) allow us to provide nutritious meals to all children enrolled in the Head Start centers. Meals include breakfast, lunch, and afternoon snacks.

Education Services - Preparing for Kindergarten

Community Action Agency for McHenry County Head Start's vision is that children grow up and achieve economic success so that their children are not born into poverty. As one step to help us in meeting this vision, our high-quality early childhood education program prepares children for kindergarten. We teach to all areas of child development and early learning outlined by the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework. We individualize, differentiate, and personalize our instruction so that all children grow and develop while in our program.

To help teachers be effective, we have a number of supports and tools. To name a few:

* Teachers regularly receive clear feedback from their Site Director on their effectiveness. This feedback is aligned with the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework: Ages Birth to Five describes the skills, behaviors, and knowledge that the program must foster in all children

* Each teacher is supported by an Instructional Coach who regularly mentors them, models effective teaching for them, and provides general instructional leadership; and

* Teachers are scored two times per year on the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) by their Site Directors and the Child Services Manager.

Average Teaching Strategies Gold Child Outcomes for Spring 2022-2023

- To measure the development of our children, children are regularly observed and assessed over the year. All children are assessed using Teaching Strategies GOLD, which is an observational assessment that links to our Creative Curriculum and lesson planning. All of our preschoolers are assessed through documentation observation three times each year through Teaching Strategies GOLD.

The education department strongly believes that outcomes were much lower this year due to COVID-19 and teaching remotely; however, the agency increased 22%-41% in all domains since the beginning of the school year. The education department will focus on additional trainings for the teaching staff next year to improve child outcomes.

Health Services

Children need to be healthy to learn. Health care services include dental, mental health, nutrition, and physical activities.

· All children and families are assisted in obtaining physicals and immunizations.

Fiscal Year 2021-2022:

(100%) of enrolled children maintained an ongoing source of continuous accessible health care. All children in the programs (100%) were up to date on a schedule of age-appropriate preventive measures and primary health care standards according to the EPSDT schedule for well childcare.

• Of the **212** children, **188** (**88**%) were determined by a health care professional to be up to date on all immunizations appropriate for their age. **5** children (**2**%) were determined to have received all immunizations possible, however had not received all immunizations appropriate for their age. **0** children (**0**%) met the state requirement for an exemption from immunizations.

• The number of children diagnosed by a health care professional who received medical treatment for the following chronic health conditions:

• Dental care includes screenings, exams, fluoride, and dental education including tooth brushing after a meal at school. Out of **212 children**, **108 (50%)** had continuous, accessible dental care provided by a dentist, and **139 (65%)** received preventative dental care.

 \cdot Nutrition services provide enrolled children with at least two or three of their daily-required nutritional needs through breakfast, lunch, and snack at the centers. Children in full-day programs also receive snacks in the afternoon.

- For fiscal year 2022-2023, our program had 14 children receiving special education.
- For fiscal year 2022-2023, as recruitment and enrollment efforts continued throughout the summer, we started the new school year with additional children with IEPs. This school year so far 14 children already have the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and we referred fourteen children to the school districts for further evaluations.

Head Start staff throughout the year attends a number of annual reviews and transition meetings in school districts where our enrollees are dually placed.

The program also provides to the families list of resources and activities pertaining to the needs of children with disabilities, including summer camps and activities through the Northern Illinois Special Recreation Association.
